

Common Core Lesson: Art Criticism and Aesthetics in Understanding and Appreciating Art

Grade Level: 9th - 12th grade

Subject: Art History

Objective: Students will be able to understand the basics of art criticism and aesthetics, and how they can be used to analyze, appreciate, and evaluate works of art.

Materials:

Art history textbooks or online resources, see resources below for recommended books
Examples of artworks from various art movements and styles
Chart paper or whiteboard
Writing materials

Procedure:

Introduction (10 minutes)

Begin by discussing the concepts of art criticism and aesthetics, defining them for the students.



Engage the students by asking them to share their thoughts on what they believe art criticism and aesthetics entail.

Art Criticism (15 minutes)

Provide an overview of art criticism, explaining its purpose and key elements.

Discuss the different techniques used in art criticism, such as analyzing composition, color, texture, style, and historical/cultural context.

Show visual examples of artworks and guide students in analyzing them using art criticism techniques.

Facilitate a class discussion on the observations, interpretations, and evaluations made by the students regarding the artworks.

Aesthetics (15 minutes)

Facilitate a conversation that highlights the diversity of perspectives and the subjectivity of aesthetic judgment.

Reflection and Writing (15 minutes)

Ask students to individually reflect on the importance of art criticism and aesthetics in understanding and appreciating art.

Instruct students to write a short argumentative essay that discusses the role of art criticism and aesthetics in analyzing, appreciating, and evaluating works of art.

Remind students to support their arguments with evidence and examples from the class discussions and their own experiences.

Assessment:

Assess students' understanding of art criticism and aesthetics through their active participation in class discussions, group presentations, and written reflections. Evaluate students' ability to analyze artworks using art criticism techniques and aesthetic principles, as demonstrated in their group presentations and written arguments.
